School Committee approves updated **Program of Studies**

PALMER – At last week's School Committee meeting, the committee heard updates to the school's Program of Studies and shared communications from the public about the school's administration.

At the March 19 meeting, Superintendent Matthew Francis presented the Superintendent's Report. Sue North, Principal at the High School, provided an overview of changes to the Program of Studies so that the committee would be able to make an informed decision.

North began her presentation by thanking Assistant Principals Amy Herring and Enrique Sanchez for their work on the program. Changes to the program included specifying the school's English course offerings and renaming the Foreign Language classes to "World Language." North highlighted the inclusion of a Health and Physical Education course.

"Back on Nov. 20 at the School Committee meeting you had voted and approved for the Program of Studies to match exactly what the law says, and that is for 7th through 12th grade, each year, to have physical education," North said.

Another change in language was to the former Foundations of Reading course, now changed to Ac-

MONSON—The Town of Monson Board of Selectmen's meeting, combined with the Finance and School Committees, saw a packed room of concerned citizens, educators, parents and local officials on March 24.

The session, held at 7 p.m., began with a round of applause honoring Monson High School's Olivia

Chrzan, who was recently named the West Mass Player of the Year in basketball. Chrzan, a senior, was recognized for her extraordinary achievements, including a remarkable career total of 2,287 points, the highest ever in Monson High's history, surpassing both male and female records.

"Monson is very proud of you," stated Brian Ashe (D-Longmeadow) a member of the Massachusetts House of Representatives, who presented Olivia with an official citation signed by both Ashe and State Rep. Angelo Puppolo, Jr. (D-Springfield).

Chrzan, who boasts a 100.4 GPA, is currently ranked second in her class and plans to attend Western New England University. Ashe, who has long been an advocate for local schools, spoke passionately about the impact sports had on his own life, noting that basketball played a pivotal role in his personal development.

The accolades, howevquickly gave way to serious discussions about the town's budget, specifically concerning potential cuts to education, staff and vital programs due to financial constraints.

Planning **Board** balancing growth

MONSON—The Monson Planning Board convened for its monthly meeting on March 18 addressing a variety of topics, from estate lot approvals to zoning bylaw changes and new development proposals. The meeting covered crucial topics regarding local zoning laws, land development, and housing, with a focus on ensuring balanced growth in the commu-

Estate lot approval on Paradise Lake Road

The meeting kicked off with a continuation of a public hearing for an estate lot on Paradise Lake Road. Clark Salazzo, representing the applicant, provided updates on changes to the proposed driveway and turnaround area. These revisions, which were approved by the fire chief, are designed to accommodate the largest emergency vehicles. Board members discussed concerns raised by the Conservation Commission regarding a monitoring well located on the property. Salazzo was unable to determine the well's purpose or history, and town records did not offer additional insights. However, it was confirmed that no construction would take place near the well. Following the discussion, the Planning Board reviewed the estate lot plan and previously approved conditions from 2022, which included construction guide-

HOLYOKE - For the first time in several years, it was gorgeous weather for the Holyoke St. Patrick's Road Race last Saturday afternoon the city streets.

While the race course, commonly known as a "hilly" course throughout downtown Holyoke ending with a turn off Beech St. and up the hill on Hampden St. toward the finish line remained largely the same, there was one noticeable change in this year's
