Task Force holds annual **Scarecrow Contest**

PALMER - The Domestic Violence Task Forces's annual Scarecrow Contest is underway, with two Build-a-Scarecrow events at the library.

The Domestic Violence Task Force was established in 2009 by Madeline Smola, and has been worked on my many people since then. Director and Coordinator Crystal Rondeau started as a volunteer for the organization eight years ago, and has been the director for the past two-and-a-half

Rondeau said that she has a Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice and Offender Rehabilitation and Victims Advocacy, and has worked in the field of domestic violence for eight years.

"The purpose of task force is about raising awareness," Rondeau said. "We do directly help survivors very often. The Palmer Police Department will give us a call, or sometimes victims reach out, or people who reside in Palmer or have fled to Palmer."

The task force does a lot of community events to raise awareness about domestic violence and provide literature about resources available to the community.

"Myself and other volunteers have been doing kid-friendly and family-friendly events to create opportunities for families to do things for little to no money," Rondeau said.

such family-friendly One event is the third annual townwide Scarecrow Contest, which involves the Build-a-Scarecrow events in partnership with the Palmer Public Library. Rondeau said that a previous event, a children's clothing swap, left the task force with a lot of clothes to use to make scarecrows.

'We have a lot of clothing that we're stuffing with newspapers that were donated by Turley Publications," Rondeau said. "They're stuffing life-sized clothing that wasn't claimed at the swap.'

"I went out today to the thrift store and picked up more clothes because we had so many people come last time," Rondeau said.

Member Karen Nothe-Valley reported on the Finance Subcommittee meeting, which met on Sept. 30. Nothe-Valley described a communication the superintendent and school committee received from the Finance Director, Jamie Farnum, about prior year bills and budget concerns.

"The nature of the concerns included things like the unpaid Fiscal Year '24 electricity and gas bills," Nothe-Valley said. "We reviewed some of the historical emails and had a very light, very preliminary look ahead at the Fiscal Year 2026 budget calendar."

Nothe-Valley reported that subsequent to the meeting, the Finance Committee reached out and invited the School Committee to an Oct. 21 meeting to further discuss these concerns. Nothe-Valley and Com-
